Beneath the star, a stable small, Held the greatest gift of all. A child asleep, so sweet, so mild, The Savior born, the holy child.


So every year, when stars appear, Remember love, spread joy, bring cheer. For in the light of Christmas's glow, The brightest star helps hearts to grow.

Juniper nodded. "It's special. Legend has it that if we ring it together under the moonlight, it brings a bit of Christmas magic."



A fun, delicious, and hands-on experience that brought language and culture together in the tastiest way!




















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




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






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Student council Training at Agenzija Żgħażagħ


An interactive talk with Professor Joseph Borg about DNA, becoming a scientist and project Maleth, the project that is sending cubes with Maltese samples to SPACE!

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SPACEOMIX

The Maleth Program, also known as Project Maleth is the first Maltese space bioscience program carried out by SpaceOMIX, that sent skin tissue samples from diabetic foot ulcer (DFU) patients to be studied on the International Space Station (ISS) in 2021. Maleth II is now on its way to following up on these findings on its second space research mission. The mission, enabled by the ICE Cubes service, a commercial service provider in partnership with ESA, is designed to replicate and validate the observations of the Maleth I mission, as well as conduct additional research on other cell types.





Maleth I

Project Maleth I was the first ever Maltese mission in space. It focuses on research to improve precision-based medicine in treating diabetic foot ulcers more efficiently.

Professor Joseph Borg, a molecular geneticist and biomedical laboratory scientist at the University of Malta, is the lead of Project Maleth. The project focuses on research to improve precisionbased medicine in the treatment of Diabetic Foot Ulcers (DFUs). The study will look at human skin microbiome samples from Type 2 diabetic patients who have DFUs that are resistant to treatment. The term "microbiome" refers to all microorganisms that live in or on the human body, including bacteria and fungi. researchers wanted to send these samples to space, specifically the International Space Station (ISS) because microgravity and the harsh conditions of space provide a unique opportunity better study the resistance of such microorganisms. A combined total of eleven skin tissue samples were sent to investigate the effects of spaceflight on DFU skin microbiomes and their resistance to harsh environments through Maleth I and II.

Every Tuesday during second break, the Maquis Club gathers to help the environment, focusing especially on the beautiful maquis area that separates the middle and senior school.

In the first term, we rolled up our sleeves and got to work clearing and reinforcing the stone pathways, making them more accessible for

everyone. But we didn't stop there! We crafted cozy bug hotels—fondly named 'Buggingham Hotels'—by repurposing old wooden boxes and filling them with sticks, leaves, and snail shells. Now, our little maquis critters have a five-star place to call home! Next on our list is building birdhouses out of recycled wooden pallets, which will soon be perched in the trees, providing shelter for local birds.

We also have a big project in the works—creating an easy-to-read map of all the plant species in the maquis. This will help students and teachers alike explore and learn about the area's rich biodiversity.

Recently, we also joined a global rainfall campaign alongside schools from Ireland, Slovenia, Greece, and Croatia. Since the start of Term 2, we've been diligently measuring rainfall from the energy terrace on the school roof. Our findings are recorded and sent directly to NASA, where they become part of a worldwide database accessible to scientists, educators, and policymakers.

We'll soon jump into the Green Up Campaign, where we'll study two wild fig trees in the maquis. Every week, we will take careful measurements and observations of selected branches and share our findings with students across the globe who are conducting similar studies.

Recipe
