

































































Dia de los Muertos

Ms. Maria Teacher of Spanish



Dia de los Muertos, or Day of the Dead, is a vibrant and colorful Mexican celebration that honors deceased loved ones. Taking place from October 31st to November 2nd, it coincides with the Catholic holidays of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day. Rather than being a mournful occasion, Dia de los Muertos is a festive and joyful celebration of life and death.

Families create elaborate altars called "ofrendas" adorned with marigolds, candles, sugar skulls, and photographs of the departed. The belief is that during this time, the spirits of the deceased return to the world of the living to enjoy the offerings and the company of their loved ones. Families may also visit cemeteries to clean and decorate graves, sharing stories and memories.

Food plays a significant role, with special dishes and treats prepared as offerings. Pan de muerto (bread of the dead) and sugar skulls are common culinary symbols. The celebration is a unique blend of indigenous beliefs and Catholic traditions, fostering a sense of community, remembrance, and the belief that death is a natural part of the human experience.

How to Make Pan de Muerto?

Make the bread dough.

Turn the dough out onto a floured surface and knead until smooth and elastic.

Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled in size.

Punch the dough down and shape into a large round loaf with a round knob on top.

Place on a baking sheet, loosely cover, and let rise again in a warm place.

Bake until golden brown.

Make the glaze, then glaze the cooled bread.



Ingredients

Bread:

¼ cup milk

- ¼ cup butter or margarine
- ¼ cup warm water (110 degrees F/45 degrees C)
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- ¼ cup white sugar
- 2 teaspoons anise seed
- 1 ¼ teaspoons active dry yeast
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 large eggs, beaten
- 1 tablespoon orange zest





Method

To make the bread: Heat milk and butter in a medium saucepan over low heat until butter melts. Remove from heat and add warm water. Mixture should be around 110 degrees.

Combine 1 cup flour, sugar, anise seed, yeast, and salt in a large bowl. Beat in warm milk mixture, then add eggs and orange zest; beat until well combined. Stir in 1/2 cup flour and continue adding more flour until dough is soft.

Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic. Place dough into a lightly greased bowl. Cover with plastic wrap and let rise in a warm place until doubled in size, 1 to 2 hours.

Punch dough down and shape into a large round loaf with a round knob on top. Place dough onto a baking sheet; loosely cover with plastic wrap. Let rise in a warm place until just about doubled in size, about 1 hour.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees.

Bake in the preheated oven until golden brown, 20 to 30 minutes. Cool slightly before brushing with glaze.

To make the glaze: Combine 1/4 cup sugar, orange juice, and orange zest in a small saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat and boil for 2 minutes. Brush glaze over top of warm bread. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons sugar.



San Andrea Students @ the MICC

During the month of September 10 students from San Andrea spent 8 days in Poland attending The MICC (Model International Criminal Court) This project aims to improve students' understanding of how international criminal law and its institutions work. It raises awareness on human rights violations and humanitarian crimes that are punished under international law. The simulation court is a hands-on approach to this subject where international cases are discussed afresh, and the judges have to come up with new verdicts depending on the most convincing arguments brought up by the prosecutors or the defendant lawyers.



In the programme we participated in there were 3 cases and I was assigned as the prosecutor in the Simon Bikindi case. Simon Bikindi (1954-2018) was a very popular Rwandan singer-songwriter who was convicted for incitement to genocide through his songs during the Rwandan war between 1990 and 1994. We were given detailed material to study the case and our arguments as prosecutors in the case assigned to us were convincing enough for the judges to prove Simon Bikindi once again. For me it was an amazing experience as I had a through insight of the Roman Statute outlining the human rights and an immersive practice in a court case which was so well organised and mirroring a real court atmosphere. This experience helped me also to confirm my line of career. It was a unique experience which I will treasure for ever.
